**Comments:** Techbook provides students with an wide array of unique tools with which to engage with US History. The techbook and its supplementary resources address all relevant Florida standards in multiple ways. Content is presented consistently through engage, explore, explain, elaborate, and evaluate tabs which sequence the relevant content, resources, and assessments. Activities and resources challenge students on all DOK levels. Strengths of this content include the many videos, images, activities, and other supplemental resources that accompany the primary text. These resources are easily accessible alongside the text and provide excellent context and diverse learning. The techbook draws on Discovery Education's library of content, which is frequently updated. Resources appear in the form of reading passages, primary sources, and graphic organizers. Content activities contribute to content mastery. Many resources are available for download and printing. Students are also provided a workbook with built in QR codes that link to the digital text when used. Unique features such as global news, reference glossary, and the atlas also support content mastery and real world application. Text can be differentiated for low readers. UDL supporting tools such as text enlargement, text to speech, and highlighter are available. The techbook's content transitions and navigates well. It is visually engaging and appealing to students and provides unique tools such as the board builder. Assessment tools are also built in for summative and formative assessment. Standards-linked question banks are also provides tools to organize and deliver content. Design is intuitive and will appeal to teachers. Weaknesses include its reliance on technology as a medium. Schools and students without internet-accessible devices will be unable to take full advantage of the "tech"book. It is primarily a digital content tool and resource.
