The weakness is that the lexile written is appropriate for regular students but doesn't provide much rigor to differentiate. Without the form the textbook makers provided standards would only be known to the teacher and not the student. Students should have these references as well in their textbooks (where found) as well as on the assessments provided. Due to its easy to read nature this textbook would be a great adoption for many schools. As an educator it will be easy to reference specific information since it is so nicely organized.
