The only things mentioned about Thomas Jefferson's presidency are his foreign affairs (Louisiana Purchase, Barbary War, Emnbargo. Also mentioned was the election of 1800. Hamilton is mentioned but not the duel with Burr.

21. SS.8.A.3.15: Examine this time period (1763-1815) from the perspective of historically under-represented groups (children, indentured servants, Native Americans, slaves, women, working class).

Only ones not mentioned are in the remarks of the standard: John Jay and Peter Salem.
