Comments: Content is standards-based and grade-level appropriate. Strengths include the diversity of resources provided to both students and instructional staff including digital media, graphic organizers, and assessment tools. Self-monitoring tools are also strong. UDL tools make differentiation possible for low or language learners. Materials are flexible and can be tailored to meet classroom time constraints. Weaknesses include its technology dependence. Without appropriate technology resources in an instructional or home setting, learners will be unable to utilize the many useful features listed above. Additionally, professional development for staff may be necessary to fully access and utilize all tools effectively. Overall, I feel that this material can be effective for learners of all ranges and can provide instructional staff with many options and resources to engage learners while meeting all necessary state standards.

Text references Greek direct and representative democracy under Pericles. Teacher resources include student activities relating Greek government to the US Constitution.

2. **SS.6.C.1.2:** Identify how the government of the Roman Republic contributed to the development of democratic principles (separation of powers, rule of law, representative government, civic duty).

Test references the legacy of Rome's legal system and its republican ideals. Civic duty is specifically cited in reference to Cincinnatus. The Twelve Tables are also discussed in the context of the rule of law. Teacher resources include interactive whiteboard activities and assessment items.

3. **SS.6.C.2.1:** Identify principles (civic participation, role of government) from ancient Greek and Roman civilizations which are reflected in the American political process today, and discuss their effect on the American political process. Â

Text references civic duty, rule of law, and representative democracy and their impact on the American society. Teacher resources include civics resources, but are not presented in the context of Greek or Roman history.

4. **SS.6.E.1.1:** Identify the factors (new resources, increased productivity, education, technology, slave economy, territorial expansion) that increase economic growth.

Slavery and territorial expansion as both referenced as economic factors in the context of Athenian society. Chinese achievements during the Han dynasty such as the waterwheel and rudder are referenced in the context of technology supporting increased productivity and economic growth. Other technological achievements are present as well in this context for other civilizations. Multiple teachers resources are provided to address this standard.

5. SS.6.E.1.2: Describe and identify traditional and command economies as they appear in different civilizations.

Students are introduced to traditional and command economies early in text specific to economics. The text references the economies of several world civilizations, but does not provide extensive content. Students are presented with this standard early so as to apply it to subsequent content with context.

6. **SS.6.E.1.3:** Describe the following economic concepts as they relate to early civilization: scarcity, opportunity cost, supply and demand, barter, trade, productive resources (land, labor, capital, entrepreneurship).

The text references these economic concepts and provides assessments for them. Students are presented with this standard early so as to apply it to subsequent content with context. It is implied in history specific text.

7. **SS.6.E.2.1:** Evaluate how civilizations through clans, leaders, and family groups make economic decisions for that civilization providing a framework for future city-state or nation development.

Text references this standard in the context of the bronze age and development of other early civilization. Social structure is also discussed frequently in an economic context for many world civilizations in the text.

8. **SS.6.E.3.1:** Identify examples of mediums of exchange (currencies) used for trade (barter) for each civilization, and explain why international trade requires a system for a medium of exchange between trading both inside and among various regions.

The text references currency in the context of the Qin and Song dynasties. Trade and mediums of exchange are also extensively discussed in the context of Egypt and Kush, Ancient Greece, and Neolithic humans.

9. SS.6.E.3.2: Categorize products that were traded among civilizations, and give examples of barriers to trade of those products.

Trade as well as products are extensively covered for each world civilization. For example, the text specifically covers this standard in the context of trade on the silk road and the construction of the Great Wall to protect merchants from attack.

10. **SS.6.E.3.3:** Describe traditional economies (Egypt, Greece, Rome, Kush) and elements of those economies that led to the rise of a merchant class and trading partners.

The text specifically references egyptian, kush, greek, and roman economies in the context of social classes and development. Trade between civilizations is also discussed in the text.

Text references trade in Babylon as well as Kush's trade relationships to address this standard.

The beginning of each chapter provides a map featuring longitude and latitude for student context and references. The map is specific to the content discussed in the chapter, but connect to past and future content. Using these maps is also discussed independently.

Specific maps are present throughout text and types of maps addressed in this standard are discussed independently in the text as well.

The text references physical natural wonders such as Mt. Everest and the Nile River. It also incorporates these wonders as a teacher resource in the context of interpreting maps.

The text specifically references these tools and provides content related maps and resources to apply them.

Maps are present throughout text as context. Specific bodies of water such as the Tigris, Mediterranean, Ganges, and Nile are referenced in the context of supporting the development of world civilizations.

Text provides frequent map resources in context of ancient world boundaries.
