Comments: All standards are mentioned and can be assessed with the materials presented. this submission is streamlined to fulfill standards, which could be both a strength and a weakness. Overall, the software is very sleek, but leaves open some interesting connections between topics. There are many multiple choice modules to assess progress and understanding, which again is efficient, but might not be ling term effective for every student mind. It will have to be made clear by the engaging teacher to maintain overall effectiveness beyond ticking all the standards boxes. Strong features are the interactive visual glossary, as well as the adjustability of the pace of learning on each topic ("scope"). The software can be effectively used to manage all aspects of the STEM learning process, ranging from planning, monitoring, exploring, testing, evaluating and challenging students.
