## The Florida College System Transparency, Accountability, Progress, and Performance

What are the preferred destination institutions for high school graduates who immediately enter college?


Florida College System (FCS) institutions are the destination of choice for recent high school (H.S.) graduates. Peterson's – a company that provides students with tools to help select the right school to meet their needs – cites community colleges as good places for young adults to cost effectively enter college while exploring and refining career goals. Community colleges help students strengthen skills in specific academic subjects, equipping them with the tools needed to reach academic and career goals. Earning an Associate in Arts degree from an FCS institution provides for seamless transfer into baccalaureate degree programs at public in-state universities and FCS institutions (2+2).

Table 1 shows the five-year enrollment trends of prior-year, Florida H.S. graduates by postsecondary sector. In the year following H.S. graduation, more students enroll in the FCS than in any other postsecondary sector. In 2010-11, nearly two-thirds of H.S. graduates who immediately enrolled in postsecondary education attended an FCS institution, which is a modest one-year increase (0.4 percent). Over five years, the number of students enrolling in the FCS after H.S. has increased nearly 10 percent from 55,747 to 61,290. The FCS plays an important role in providing higher education access to graduates immediately transitioning from high school to postsecondary education.

Figure 1 shows the five-year enrollment history of prior-year, Florida H.S. graduates and the in-state postsecondary sectors into which they immediately transitioned. Six out of 10 H.S. graduates in 2010-11 (93,704) directly transitioned into Florida's postsecondary education system. Recent national data show a 68 percent directtransition-into-college rate among H.S. graduates across the country. In Florida during 2010-11, there were 3,810 H.S. graduates who enrolled in multiple sectors. The State University System (SUS) received approximately 31 percent of prior year Florida H.S. graduates in 2011-12 while the Independent Colleges and Universities of Florida (ICUF) and technical centers received



5 percent and 2 percent, respectively. The picture has remained relatively stable over the last five-years. More recent H.S. graduates have consistently transitioned into college at an FCS institution in the year following H.S. completion.
