Introduction

Florida's Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) Standards were adopted by the State Board of Education on February 12, 2020. In Spring 2023, a B.E.S.T. Writing field test was administered to a representative sample of Florida students. The first operational administration of B.E.S.T. Writing was the Spring 2024 administration.

Please refer to the B.E.S.T. Writing Fact Sheet for more information on the B.E.S.T. Writing program.

Most students, including English Language Learners (ELLs) and exceptional student education (ESE) students, enrolled in the tested grade levels participate in the B.E.S.T. test administrations. Allowable accommodations are provided to ELL and ESE students with these accommodations documented on their Individual Education Plans (IEPs) or Section 504 Plans.

Testing Format

Sample items are available in the Sample Items area of Florida's Assessment Portal.

Paper-based accommodated test forms are provided for students with that accommodation listed on their IEPs or Section 504 Plans. Accommodated paper-based forms include regular print, large print, braille, and one-item-per-page; and computer-based accommodations include answer masking and text-to-speech (TTS).

B.E.S.T. Writing Scores

The B.E.S.T. Writing assessment is scored and reported on a 12-point rubric with the following dimensions: Purpose/Structure, Development, and Language. Each dimension is worth four possible points. Students will receive an overall raw score out of 12 points, with a minimum score of 3, and a raw score out of 4 points for each dimension. The B.E.S.T. Writing Rubrics are available on the FDOE website and are broken out by grade band (4–6 and 7–10) and prompt mode (Argumentative or Expository).

The B.E.S.T. Writing results are reported in Family Portal. B.E.S.T. Writing scores are reported separately from FAST ELA Reading; the two scores are not combined to create an overall ELA score. In addition, B.E.S.T. Writing scores are not reported in real time like other statewide assessments; they are reported **after** the testing window closes once all responses have been scored and quality assurance checks have been completed.

The following information is reported for the Spring 2024 testing window for grades 4–10 B.E.S.T. Writing:

- Students will receive an overall raw score and raw score by writing dimension (points earned out of points possible).
- Comparisons at the school, district, and state levels will be provided.

Family Portal

Families can access their student's B.E.S.T. Writing results in Family Portal using the login information provided by the student's school, which includes the student's unique six-digit access code. Families can access the portal directly from the <u>FAST</u> <u>portal</u> or through their district's Student Information System (SIS). Starting in Summer 2024, we have enhanced the look of Family Portal to improve the user experience.




Figure 1. Family Portal Dashboard

On the Dashboard (Figure 1), families can see their student's overall raw score and download or print a copy of their student's Individual Student Report (ISR). Scores and ISRs are available in Family Portal after the testing window. Families can access additional information about their student's results by clicking on the View Detailed Report button (purple-shaded area). To download a copy of the ISR, families can click on the Download Detailed Report button (orange-shaded area).

Note: If a student is assigned a condition code, only an ISR will be available. The score will display the condition code. A condition code is assigned when a student's response does not meet the minimum requirements to receive a score. If a student left the response blank, there would be no record.





Figure 2. Family Portal – Detailed Report Page

The View Detailed Report button will navigate to the Detailed Report page (<u>Figure 2</u>), which contains the following tabs (<u>orange-shaded area</u>):

• **Overall:** This tab displays the overall results for the assessment that the student completed (<u>Figure 2</u>). For B.E.S.T. Writing, this includes the student's overall raw score and raw score by writing dimension.

- **Test Questions:** This tab displays the student's performance on the item (<u>Figure 3</u>). The number in the Item # column (<u>blue</u>-shaded area) is clickable and navigates to the student's response. The Result column (<u>purple</u>-shaded area) will display one of the following symbols, depending on the student's score:
 - **Correct** If the student received a score of 12/12.
 - Partial If the student received a score between 3/12 and 11/12.
 - Incorrect If the student was assigned a condition code.
 - Blank Not applicable to B.E.S.T. Writing.
- **Responses:** This tab displays the writing prompt the student received, the student's actual response and the rubric used to score the response (<u>Figure 4</u>). Responses for students who tested using paper-based accommodations will be available later than CBT responses due to handscoring and scanning activities.





Figure 5. Family Portal – Resources Tab

- Resources to Help Your Student: This tab contains links to resources corresponding to the test (Figure 5).

Figure 4. Family Portal – Responses Tab

Individual Student Reports (ISR)

This is a one-page report that provides a summarized overview of a student's performance. Below are explanations for the different sections included in the ISR for B.E.S.T. Writing. The student's school may provide this report electronically through the district's parent portal, a printed copy may be generated and distributed, or it may be accessed through the Family Portal.

B.E.S.T. Writing Individual Student Report

The top of the ISR contains student, school, and district information and the grade level assessment the student took. The example shown in the following graphic is for a grade 4 B.E.S.T. Writing test:

- **Score information**: The **blue**-shaded area displays the student's raw score.
- **Score comparison:** The **purple**-shaded area allows parents to see how their student's raw score compares with their peers at the school, district, and state level.
- **Notes for families**: The **orange**-shaded area contains important notes for families. This information may change between administrations.
- **Performance by Writing Dimension:** The **green**-shaded section displays the student's achievement for each writing dimension on the test.


Figure 6. B.E.S.T. Writing Individual Student Report

B.E.S.T. Writing Individual Student Report with a Condition Code

Should a student response receive a condition code, the condition code text will be displayed instead of a score. The example shown in the following graphic is for an assessment with the Copied Text condition code. See below for a list of other possible condition codes.

- Score information: The blue-shaded area displays the condition code the student received.
- Score comparison: The purple-shaded area allows parents to see the average raw score at the school, district, and state level.
- Notes for families: The orange-shaded area contains important notes for families. This information may change between administrations.
- Performance by Writing Dimension: The green-shaded section displays a description of the condition code the student received.

Condition Codes

When a condition code is assigned to a student response, no score is reported for that student. One of the following condition codes is assigned when a student's response does not meet the minimal requirements to receive a score.

Condition Code	Description
Insufficient	The response does not contain enough writing to be scored.
Off-Topic	The response does not address the writing prompt.
Foreign Language	The response is written in a language other than English.
Illegible/Incomprehensible	The response cannot be read or understood.
Copied Text	The response consists of Copied Text from the passages and an insufficient amount of original student writing.
Common Refusal/ Common Refusal Words	The response indicated non-participation in the writing task.
