Early Learning Population

1.3 million children younger than 6¹

42% percent of those are from low-income families¹

Of the 42%, 27% participated in the SR Program²
 221,715 children are enrolled in Fiscal Year 2019-20³

71% of Florida's 4-year-olds participated in the VPK Program⁴

- 166,726 children enrolled in Program Year 2019-20

State-Level Duties & Responsibilities

- Designated as lead to administer state and federal child care funds (Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG)/Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF)) – Florida's SR Program
- Responsible for implementing state's VPK program
- Partner with **30 early learning coalitions**, Redlands Christian Migrant Association (RCMA) and others to deliver comprehensive, statewide early learning services
- Accountable to the Commissioner of Education

The Florida Department of Education (FDOE), through the Office of Early Learning (OEL), has allocated more than \$363 million in funding to support Florida's youngest learners.

These funds, from Child Care and Development Funds (CCDF), General Revenue (GR), Preschool Development Grant (PDG), and Coronavirus, Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act), may be used to provide the resources and support needed to help providers remain open or re-open as soon as they can safely do so. A description of Florida's responses to provide resources and supports to both families and child care providers is below. Each of the supports provided are consistent with the following principles:

\$363 Million

in funding to support Florida's youngest learners. Strategically rebuild the early childhood education and care landscape with an emphasis on quality providers.

 Provide local early learning coalitions with flexibility, as appropriate, to leverage established partnerships and available resources.

 Redirect existing federal discretionary funding, as appropriate to support families, providers and communities.

 Enhance the early childhood education and care workforce through incentives to gain new skills and expand existing skills, competency and professionalism.



OEL implemented the following actions to provide supports to both School Readiness (SR) and Voluntary Pre-Kindergarten (VPK) families and child care providers.

CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT FUNDS (CCDF) - \$119.5M (MARCH - OCTOBER)

 Spring 2020: Distributed to providers \$14.2 million in mini-grants to meet infrastructure, cleaning and supply needs and teacher training stipends.

March-August 15, 2020: Suspended terminations of SR child care services, and extended timelines for submission of
paperwork by parents to maintain eligibility for families.

May-October 2020: Provided flexibility for eligibility for SR child care by adding "job search" as a purpose for care
for families.

 April-September 2020: Waived required SR copayments for parents, and reimbursed SR (birth – age 5 and school-age programs) (\$9.6M per month) based on enrollment as opposed to attendance (\$7.9M per month).

GENERAL REVENUE FUNDS (GR) - \$84.4 MILLION

 April-September 2020: Reimbursed VPK providers based on enrollment as opposed to attendance. Totaling \$84.4M from April – September 2020.

PRESCHOOL DEVELOPMENT GRANT FUNDS (PDG) - \$4 MILLION

 The PDG funds, designed to strengthen Florida's overall early childhood system to improve quality early learning experiences for children, were redirected to provide mini-grants to support the provision of mental health services to child care staff and the families they serve, as well as provided support for the use of high-quality curriculum by SR providers (\$2M for each two sets of mini-grants to early learning coalitions).









II. CARES ACT RESPONSE

The information below describes Florida's use of the CARES ACT funds to support the state's childcare providers and the families they serve. To date, \$155,312,343 of Florida's total \$223,605,108 allocation have been awarded.

A. CHILD CARE FOR HEALTH CARE WORKERS AND FIRST RESPONDERS - \$52.9M

In April 2020, OEL, in coordination with local early learning coalitions, prioritized and increased access to child care services for health care and first responder professionals by creating a referral process and financial incentives for programs to swiftly provide expedited access and expedited referrals for 26,000 children of first responders and health care professionals (as of 9/8/2020).
 87% of these children are new enrollments in the program. Over 4,000 eligible early learning/child care providers, with SR contracts, received a monthly bonus/incentive of \$500 per child (with a maximum limit of \$12,000 per provider location).

\$155,312,343 of Florida's total \$223,605,108 allocation have been awarded.

B. THREE GRANT PHASES TO NEARLY 12,000 - \$88.8 MILLION EARLY LEARNING/CHILD CARE PROVIDERS

Emergency Child Care Relief Grants for Early Learning/Child Care Providers - \$52.8M

 6,500 SR and VPK providers and non-contracted providers that were open for business as of April 30, 2020 received grants to continue their services. These providers may have had intermittent closures, and providers that have closed permanently after April 30, 2020 were not eligible for these funds.

High-Quality Reopening Support Grants for Early Learning/Child Care Providers - \$19.1M

 2,300 SR and VPK providers and non-contracted providers that were closed on April 30, 2020 and reopened by August 31, 2020 received grants. These providers were required to have a Gold Seal designation or a program assessment (CLASS score) of 3.5 or higher.

Contracted SR/VPK Providers - \$16.9M

 3,100 SR and VPK providers, including contracted public/charter school providers and program assessment (CLASS) exempt providers that were closed on April 30, 2020 and reopened by August 31, 2020 received grants to assist in reopening during the COVID-19 crisis.

C. OTHER PROGRAMS - 13.6 MILLION

Successful Transition to Kindergarten - \$10.7M

Incoming kindergarten students had their preschool exparience significantly disrupted by COVID-19. Funding has
been provided to 36 school districts via their early learning coalition to implement summer programs for rising kindergarten students identified with limited language and emergent literacy skills as determined by the VPK assessments
and teacher recommendations. To date, the investment has been \$10.7M, and the remaining funds will be support
continuing this program throughout this year.

Progress Monitoring for VPK and K - \$2.9M

 A pilot program for VPK providers to use the same screening tool that is currently required for kindergarten screening (STAR Early Literacy) will begin in January and includes an evaluation component.

Successful Transition to Kindergarten: Rising K Program

- Funded through CCDF/CARES (\$10.9M) via coalitions
- 37 school districts participating
- Provide an emphasis on closing/remediating achievement gaps.
- Minimize potential learning loss due to program closures this spring.
- Set students up for success.
- Help students acclimate to kindergarten.
- Provide a jump start to the kindergarten concepts and skills.
- Provide instruction to fill any early literacy achievement gaps for children in need.





Successful Transition to Kindergarten: VPK Progress Monitoring Pilot Program

Goals

- Provide opportunity for VPK providers to implement Star Early Literacy in their VPK programs in the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 school years.
- Extend the administration of Star Early Literacy to Florida's VPK programs to establish consistency in assessments between VPK and Kindergarten.
- Provide a more comprehensive overview of the learning and growth continuum during critical early learning years.





VPK Progress Monitoring Pilot Program

- Funded through Child Care Development Fund/CARES (\$2.9M).
- Voluntary participation available on an application basis with funding for up to 1,919 providers (3,644 classrooms and 50,243 VPK students).
- Access to a variety of progress reports for students and resources as well as reports to share with parents.
- Available during Assessment Periods 1, 2 and 3 as well as throughout the school year for ongoing progress monitoring, as needed.
- Pilot study results evaluated by The Florida Center for Reading Research at Florida State University.







VPK Progress Monitoring Pilot Program

The VPK Progress Monitoring Pilot will provide the opportunity for VPK providers to implement STAR Early Literacy in their VPK programs in the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 school years. Extending the administration of STAR Early Literacy to Florida's VPK programs will establish consistency in assessments between VPK and Kindergarten and provide a more comprehensive overview of the learning and growth continuum during critical early learning years.

Participating providers will have access to a variety of progress reports for their students and resources as well as reports to share with parents. Star Early Literacy will be available during Assessment Periods 1, 2 and 3 as well as throughout the school year for ongoing progress monitoring, as needed. Pilot study results will be evaluated by The Florida Center for Reading Research at Florida State University.
