## FLORIDA TAX CREDIT Scholarship Program

## NOVEMBER 2012 QUARTERLY REPORT

## The Florida Tax Credit (FTC) Scholarship Program was

 established in 2001 to encourage private, voluntary contributions from corporate donors to non-profit scholarship funding organizations (SFO) that award scholarships to children from low-income families. Step Up For Students is the only approved participating SFO for the 2012-13 school year. A corporation can receive a dollar-for-dollar tax credit up to $100 \%$ of its state income tax liability. The program also includes credits against the insurance premium tax for contributions to eligible non-profit SFOs, credits against severance taxes on oil and gas production, self-accrued sales tax liabilities of direct pay permit holders, and alcoholic beverage taxes on beer, wine, and spirits. The maximum amount the state may award is $\$ 229$ million in credits for the 2012-2013 fiscal year.
